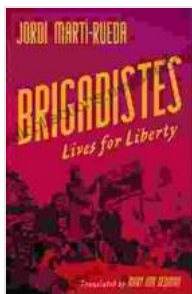


# Brigadistes: Lives For Liberty, Elizabeth Clark

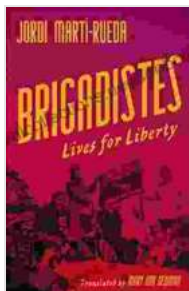
