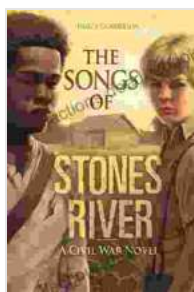

Let's build a legacy of peace,

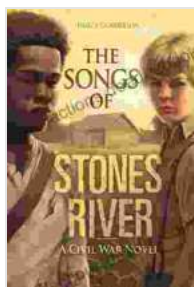
Where love and understanding thrive.”
