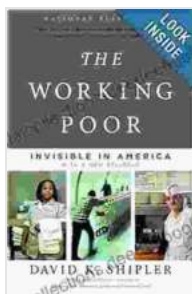


# The Working Poor: Invisible in America

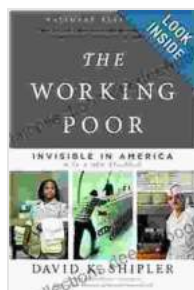

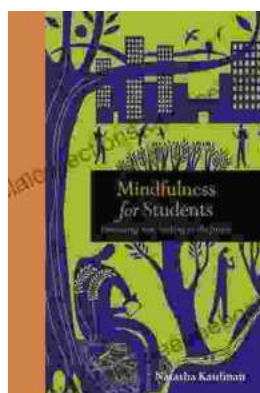
